The content of International Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflict I is: (1) The Sources, Scope and Evolution of IHL, (2) The Relationship between IHL and the Use of Force between States and IHL and Human Rights Law, (3) Combatants and Non-Combatants, (4) The Protection of Persons (injured, sick, shipwrecked, prisoners of war, civilians), (5) Non-International Armed Conflict.

#### 8. COURSE CONTENT

The object of this course is to examine international arbitration related to the resolution of commercial disputes. Reference is made by way of introduction to the institution of arbitration, the difference between internal and international arbitration, as well as the institution of arbitration and the differences from other forms of alternative dispute resolution. Moreover, the organization of commercial international arbitration is also explored, both in relation to the forms it attains (ad hoc and institutional), and also on the level of regulation (national legal order,

international conventions and regulations, private regulations). There is analysis over the crucial issue of the agreement of arbitration, with special emphasis on its autonomy and the case of which disputes are subject to arbitration. Special reference is given to the issue of jurisdiction and competence of arbitrators and the so-called Kompetenz-Kompetenz. Special issues of multilateral arbitration and taking provisional measures by arbitrators are also examined. There is detailed analysis over the aspects of arbitration procedure, primarily from the perspective of international practice. There is also presentation of the way arbitral awards are designed and finally taken, and also the problem of which law is to be applied (transnational law, methods of private international law). Another important issue is when arbitral awards are doubted before national courts, or international courts (New York Convention).

- Get in touch with arbitration regarding energy issues

#### 8. COURSE CONTENT

This course has to do with the examination of international arbitration related to the resolution of investment disputes. From their nature, as well as their value, investment disputes presuppose the participation of states for the materialization of investment. In this context, problems related to state participation, or that of state entities in international arbitration are first and foremost examined. Issues regarding consent and state immunity are examined, also in conjunction with the special regime governing investment arbitration. Special reference is made to the framework set by ICSID, with emphasis on the basic rules of arbitration (field of application, competence, arbitral process, award, annulment and execution), as well as the

secondary rules of arbitration. Furthermore, bilateral investment treaties are also explored (BITs), and special attention is given on the issue of foundational concept of investment. Further, special mention is made for certain characteristics of the applicable and substantive law. The example of energy arbitration is also explored, as it is the most frequent form of investment arbitration. There is reference to energy dispute (oil, gas, electricity, renewable energy sources), and the particular problems stemming from them. Finally, the current international conventional context is discussed and the Energy Charter Treaty in particular.
